In August of 1982, I heard of a good persimmon, and decided to check it out in early October. The tree is located about a dozen miles north of Decatur, IL, less than a block north of Cerro Gordo High School. This 14 inch diameter, tall stately tree is reported to be near 80 years old. I could have walked under it forty years before.

Fruit compares favorably with the named persimmons I have grow-Killen, at its largest, would only be medium sized compared with fruit from Pipher's tree. The fruit ripens from mid-September to the end of October.
